# "Thoughts On Raising Children"

"We" have been blessed lately with the birth of several babies to our young couples "at church", and expect several more in coming months. These are exciting times. For new parents, they are somewhat trying times as they wake up for early morning/late night feedings, changings and getting used to the roller coaster of raising children. They thrill our heart, break it, then thrill us again. As exciting as the beginning is, the best can be yet to come. Depending on our efforts and how our children respond to them, their grown years provide a comfort, peace and companionship unknown in earlier times.

Paul instructs "older" men and women to teach the "younger" how to love their husbands and children (Titus 2:1ff). "Older" folks aren't always old, and not every person is qualified to instruct. Some get to old age without having learned anything. But some have demonstrated wisdom and ability. Seek them out and listen. "Loving" our spouse and children doesn't always come naturally. There are guidelines we could all use. Let me offer some thoughts on raising our children.

1. Teach them to listen and obey. That thought doesn't come from experience, but from the Bible. Isn't that what God tried to teach Israel and Jesus teaches us. Get their attention before you try to instruct. Then insist on obedience.

2. Don't wait until they are teenagers to establish boundaries. If you enforce rules and require obedience when they are young, they will cary those behaviors into their teenage and adult years. Do not consider misbehavior when they are toddlers "cute".

You really only have about 10 years to establish the foundation and the roots of their behavior. Beyond that, you provide guidance and wisdom as they develop and make their own decisions.

3. Train them at home. Too many parents allow children to "run wild" at home then expect them to behave at a restaurant or grocery store. They can learn to sit still at the dinner table, say "please" and "thank you". Good manners will be appreciated by all who come in contact with them. This reflects well on our home.

4. Don't burden them with too many rules, especially ones you can't or won't enforce. God could have given a 1,000 commandments. Instead He gave 10. Jesus summarized them in two (Matt. 22:36ff). As they grow older, be prepared to explain "why" these rules are important.

5. Don't set them up to tell a lie. If they made a mistake, broke something in the house, or any error you become aware of, don't ask them if they did it. You already know, and you have a pretty good idea they will lie to cover it up. Just like we did when we were young.

6. It's the adults house. God didn't put a three year old in charge. Don't live in fear of their reaction. Treat children with kindness and consideration, but realize who is the responsible party. If they don't approve of the dinner menu or TV program, that's too bad. When they get their own house, they can be in charge.

7. Have family dinners. Talk to them, listen to them every day. Share the "little" things in life with them, and they will share the 'big' things and tough decisions they face as they grow.

12. Remember to enjoy them throughout life. Each stage is exciting and new. And most parents survive.
