# Heed The Warning

How many of us are guilty of refusing to give credence to the various warning signs we face every day? Why have we become so cavalier? After all they have been put in place for our well being. A few days back I witnessed a prime example of just how people simply ignore signs. A man was walking with what I assumed was his wife along the street and ran headlong into a support piece for a scaffold. There was a huge sign posted, *Men at Work, Watch Your Head!* He didn't pay that sign a moments notice. On the plus side, it brought peals of laughter to his wife as she watched him dancing around holding his bruised head (and ego). I must admit, being a fan of the Three Stooges, it was a classic moment.

In our society many warning signs are silly. "Don't use this hairdryer while still in shower!" But some are serious and essential. Paying attention to warnings is good sense, especially in spiritual matters. Throughout the pages of God's Word we find warning after warning. Each one striving to admonish us to walk with care and be mindful of the danger that lies ahead. "Careless soul, oh heed the warning..." is a line in a song we sometimes sing. But even as we sing, we may be turning a deaf ear to the meaning.

Paul reminded the elders from Ephesus, "therefore be on the alert, remembering that night and day for a period of three years I did not cease to admonish each one with tears" (Acts 20:31). Ezekiel took heed to do what God had set forth and warned the people regarding the perils of departure from God. "When I say to the wicked, 'You shall surely die'; and you do not warn him or speak out to warn the wicked from his wicked way that he may live, that wicked man shall die in his iniquity, but his blood I will require on your hand. Yet if you have warned the wicked, and he does not turn from his wickedness or from his wicked way, he shall die in his iniquity; but you have delivered yourself" (Ezek. 3:18-19). (continued)
