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## THE REMINDER

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## Is Jesus God?

Among other key themes, the apostle John puts quite a bit of emphasis in his gospel on the divinity of Jesus. The opening of the book is extraordinarily clear: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that has been made." (John 1:1-3) 'The Word,' of course, is Jesus, as John makes clear when He says, "The Word became flesh and dwelt among us." (1:14) Jesus is God, and as God, He was in the beginning and the creation of the world happened through Him.

Then, as John's account moves forward, Jesus Himself will speak to His divine identity on several occasions. Some of them are more implicit, while some are very direct. Here is a sampling of Jesus' statements in the gospel of John:

- "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life." (John 3:16) It isn't clear whether this is Jesus talking or John the narrator, but the statement is the same. Jesus is the Son of God, implying that He is divine.
- "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, truly, I say to you, before Abraham was born, I am." (John 8:58) In a stunning statement, Jesus not only references his eternal nature (existing before Abraham), but also uses the covenant name of Jehovah God to refer to Himself ("I AM"). The Jews knew exactly what He meant, and consequently took up stones to kill Him.
- "I and the Father are one." (John 10:30) In another clear statement, Jesus identifies Himself as being one and the same with the Heavenly Father. Again, the Jews knew exactly what Jesus meant, and again they take up stones to throw at Him.
- "Thomas answered and said to Him, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him, 'Because you have seen me, have you believed? Blessed are they who did not see, and yet believed." (John 20:28-29) Thomas, after seeing the resurrected Jesus, proclaims that Jesus is God. Jesus' response is not to rebuke him or correct him, but to say that this statement by Thomas demonstrates his belief.

There is one more statement from the Gospel of John that I think offers a strong conclusion to this discussion. Immediately after the story of Thomas in chapter 20—after Jesus blessed those who would not see Jesus and yet believe—John makes the following statement: "Therefore many other signs Jesus also performed in the presence of the disciples, which are not written in this book; but these have been written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and by believing you may have life in His name." (John 20:30-31)

There are two things that John emphasizes here that are important to the discussion of Jesus' divinity. One is faith, or belief. We will never be able to fully explain what it means for Jesus to be totally human and totally divine, or how that is even possible. But we can accept it by faith—and through that faith have life in His name. Second, John makes clear that this faith is based on evidence, namely the signs that Jesus performed. We can confidently believe that Jesus is the Son of God because of what He did when He was on the earth, culminating in His greatest sign—the resurrection from the dead. When Jesus rose from the dead, He proved Himself to be God in the flesh.
