Objectives:

- Tell the allegorical story of the woman Jerusalem described in this chapter.
- Connect the elements of the story to Jerusalem's relationship with Yahweh.
- Synthesize these connections with our status as the Bride of Christ.

Opening Discussion

Why would a Bible passage be this graphic? What does that teach us?

- This chapter is an allegory about the abominations of ______. (16:2)
- What are the corresponding historical realities for each element of the story?
 - Canaanite origins—Amorite father, Hittite mother (16:3)
 - Cast out, neglected upon birth (16:4-5)
 - Married, cleaned up, adorned beautifully (16:6-13)
 - Fame that went forth among the nations (16:14)
 - Used marriage gifts to play the harlot (16:15-19)

- Slaughtered her husband's children (16:20-21) - Spread her legs to lustful neighbors (16:23-29) - Bribed her lovers to come to her (16:30-34) - Lovers will turn and expose her nakedness (16:35-40) - She will no longer play the harlot (16:41-42) **Closing Discussion** What are the most convicting elements in reflecting on our own unfaithfulness?
